CRITERION I – CURRICULAR ASPECTS

1.1 – Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

Zulal Bhilajirao Patil College is affiliated to Kavayitri Bahinabai Chaudhari North Maharashtra University, Jalgaon and adheres to the curriculum designed and prescribed by the university. Towards framing of the curriculum many senior faculty members contribute as members of Board of Studies or as subject experts and input their suggestions. Further, faculties are also invited as subject expert to various colleges and institutions to contribute to syllabus designing. Our College has an effective mechanism for better delivery of curriculum: -

- Heads of the departments arrange departmental meetings to assign the workload set the time-table and distribute papers to faculty members and the faculty prepare teaching plan and try to follow it.
- Students are informed about the subjects/ courses and syllabus at the time of admission through prospectus. Orientation lectures are held in the departments on first day. The departments also provide college calendar as a part of academic session.
- Our college has a very rich central Library. There is an open access to staff members and students once library card has been issued. Library provides INFLIBNET, e-journals, Database, Shodhganga, OPEC and Book Bank facility etc. The college also provides departmental library. There is 50 Mbps internet connectivity with campus Wi-Fi facility to the teachers for effective teaching-learning.
- Our college has updated Multimedia Room, Language Lab, Computer Lab comprising 290 computers, 12 scanners, 05 Laptops, 16 LCD projectors with Screens, 46 (32+14) CCTVs, free of cost internet facility is given to students where 20 students get the advantage of this facilities at the time for one hour.
- Teaching methods adopted by staff members in classroom are

based on the needs of students and subjects and are changed accordingly. Some of them are : - i) Traditional method (blackboard) ii) PPT Presentations by teachers and students iii) ICT based teaching iv) Home assignments v) Project Work vi) Group discussions vii) Seminars and workshops viii) Guest lecturers ix)Field work x) Practical and lab experiments Regular Term end examination, and internal test are conducted. • Regular assessment and evaluation is done by teachers to keep a record of the progress of students' performance. The Examination Department helps to conduct term-end examination while internal and class test are conducted at department level. Proper record is maintained for all the afore said points at the departmental level. • Most of the departments have updated software such as; Department of English uses Orel Techno I-tell in the Language Lab, Department of Statistics uses R Software, Department of Chemistry uses Chem Draw and Chem Sketch software. Department of Psychology Statistical Packages for Social Sciences (SPSS) Software and Department of Zoology Digi Frog Software. These Software are used to deliver curricular effectively. These software generate interest for the research activity in the students. Students are able to analyse data smoothly. Amalgamation of software and teaching prove too helpful in teaching learning process. Use of software proves to be advantages for better understanding of curriculum. Our college has Microsoft Campus Agreement and provides different kinds of license

1.4.2 – How the feedback obtained is being analyzed and utilized for overall development of the institution? (maximum 500 words)

Feedback Obtained
Our college develops and conducts online feedback system for the students, parents, alumni, and teachers. Our students, parents, alumni and teachers fill the feedback forms. • Students give feedback about curriculum at the end of the final year examination. Student give feedback for all the theory and practical

courses taught to them throughout the year. Questions are based on the feedback of syllabus, adequacy of syllabus, load of syllabus, relevance of the units, size of syllabus in terms of burden, curriculum in relation to the real life application, assessment of answer books, satisfaction about teaching methodology, etc. By analyzing the students' feedback it is clear that the students are satisfied with the contact hours in the teaching, learning and evaluation process. The students get encouragement through the design which enables them for learning and updating their knowledge. The students are getting benefits by the applications of the curriculum in their life. • Alumni Feedback is conducted whenever Alumni Meets are organised in the Institute during academic year. This Feedback from Alumni evaluates subject knowledge of the program, level of meeting expectation, progress of alumni in career after graduation, programme helps in developing their personality, impact of training, motivation and encouragement they got in the college. • The feedback from the Parents helps to understand the intellectual ability, social responsibility, skill development, suitability of the courses for career growth of the ward, personality development of ward etc. Parents' feedback is based on overall development of their ward and about learning environment in the college as well as imparting value based education to their wards. • Teachers Feedback is conducted at the end of academic year. The feedback from teachers is drawn relating to satisfaction towards the curriculum. The feedback was taken on a 5 point scale. The teachers are accordingly instructed by the authorities to improve their performances. • Some of the faculties are also members of Board of Studies wherein their expertise and reported feedback is discussed in the respective BOS meetings. As per the New University Law the students are involved in the Syllabus Reframing Workshops. • Representatives are incorporated in the syllabus restructuring. New university Act 2018 is considered to improve the interaction between the University and students by way of inclusion of students' representation on BOS committee. As per existing rules the syllabus is restructured after every three years. The observations and suggestions given by the students, alumni and parents are forwarded to University. BOS Committee is incorporates newly expected suggestions in the new framework of syllabus.

2.3.2 – Students mentoring system available in the institution? Give details. (maximum 500 words)

The improvement, enhancement, and perfection in the teaching-learning process executed (implemented) effective and strong monitoring through multidimensional monitoring system. The maximum communication between student and college vice-versa are performing through subject teachers indicate significantly strong bonding between Student and teacher. The student were monitored through STG committee. • Student-Teacher Guardian (STG) Scheme has been implemented in the college with the aims and objectives as A) To establish and develop a strong, transparent, and healthy teacher-student relationship. B) The teacher should act as a mentor, guide, counsellor, supporter, and philosopher for the students. C) The teachers should have continuous and constant interaction as well as communication with students so as to solve and sort educational, socioeconomical, health and family-related problems of students, and can provide possible help to the students. The Functioning and execution of STG scheme as follows In 2019-20 academic year, a total of 3084 students of UG, PG and Research Scholars from Art, Science, and Technology, Commerce and Management faculty have participated in the activities of the STG Committee. Groups of students are formed and teachers are assigned as guardians of these groups. The teacher guardian conducts meetings of the students allotted to him/her. The teacher guardian guides students on the topics academic progress, health issues, study material availability, college departmental facilities, responsibility towards the family, society, college. The teacher guardian presents

the report to the coordinator of STG committee. The coordinator presents report to the Principal and discusses it with the Principal. After the discussion, initiatives are taken to make the student confident and empower them.

Specific efforts are taken to solve their problems. Some observations of STG scheme: 1. Some guardian teachers maintain and developed family relations with students. 2. Some guardian teachers have interactions with parents and encourage frequent parent visits in the departments and college. 3. Some teachers have conducted number of meetings. 4. Students were encouraged to attend classes regularly. 5. The students weaker in their study were motivated and properly counselled to improve their results. 6. Some of the students were motivated to participate in social gathering and they owned notable prizes in the program. 7. Financial assistance of Rs 1000/ to Rs 1500/ was given to the needy, poor and clever students. 8. Parents were informed about the irregularity of their wards and also about their performance by some teachers. 9. To avoid dropout, few students were permitted readmission in second year 10. The Competitive Counselling Section were engaging the students for various competitive examinations announced by various authorities. 11. Every year get together program for mothers of students named Mothers meet (Mata Melava) is organized in college campus to familiarize with the college environment as well as create awareness regarding various issues. The outcome of STG scheme: 1. It creates healthy relationship between mentor-mentee. 2. It facilitates a bond of affection and understanding between mentor-mentee. 3. It helps students to groom their overall personality. 4. It helps students to develop their civic sense enable them to be good human beings.

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2.5.2 – Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level (250 words)

The evaluation reforms suggested by KBCNMU, Jalgaon are administered by the Principal and Examination Committee of College. The evaluation process and reforms are continuous activities of college and updated regularly based on needs and requirements of the faculty and students. • The functioning of Examination Committee is monitored by Coordinator • The examination committee prepares and conveys timetable to UG and PG faculty and students in order to implement all the processes related to internal examinations throughout the year. • Students have informed about nature of examinations and evaluation processes. The format of question papers and weightage of marks are discussed by subject teachers during classroom teaching and laboratory work. • As soon as university displays timetable of theory and practical for external examination on its website, the committee takes cognizance, and students are informed about examination schedule well in advance by displaying it on the notice board. • The continuous evaluation of students at UG and PG levels for all the semesters done by conducting Internal examinations. • The students have to appear for internal tests and tutorial/ home assignments/seminars/ projects/study tour at the UG and PG level for every semester. • An opportunity is given to those students for internal examination who represent college in various competitions and activities such as NSS, NCC, sport, and cultural programs. • The respective teachers of subject evaluate answer sheets of the first year UG students at central assessment program (CAP) conducted in the college then performance ledger is submitted to the University for declaration of results well within time.

2.5.3 – Academic calendar prepared and adhered for conduct of Examination and other related matters (250 words)

The college adheres, follows and sticks to the academic calendar for effective process of teaching learning and evaluation. The staff meeting is conducted at the beginning and at intervals of time period during semester headed by the Principal to convey and discuss the pros and cons of functioning of the system. • An academic calendar framed highlights schedule for admission procedure, commencing and closing dates of each semester, schedule for internal and external examinations, dates of curricular, cocurricular and extracurricular activities, various activities organized as well as conducted by NCC, NSS and other departments in June for proper planning and implementation of all the activities. • Diary is distributed among teaching staff and students to record details of their participation in the day-to-day activities. • The teacher's profile, list of academic and administrative committees, leave record, an individual teaching timetable and teaching plans are collected submitted to the Principal. • HOD's of various departments distribute the workload to the teachers in departmental meeting and submitted these copies to administrative office. • Teachers prepare teaching plans of first and second term separately at the beginning of each semester and HOD's collected the teaching plans and monitor the same for effective implementation of programs. • The timetable committee prepares college timetable as per the guidelines of university. • The Departmental meetings are held regularly to discuss planning, organization and implementation of curricular and co-curricular activities for the students. • The College has a separate Result Committee which analyses the results all the Programmes and submits the results to the Principal.

To utilize scarce funds with utmost care and due diligence considering the needs for stakeholders specially students and society. To utilize available infrastructure at its optimize level to run new courses. To run and maintain physical, academic and support facilities institution has developed a system through formation of different committees like Academic, Timetable, Library, Campus development, Sports etc. There is multi-storeyed building to accommodate about 3000 students of the college. The building and its infrastructure is maintained as per standard procedures and systems established by the Management and the Principal. The institution runs three faculties. Time table committee prepares lecture schedule utilising optimum time and space in two sessions. Classrooms have capacity to accommodate 60 to 120 students with proper ventilation and light. There are 6 classrooms which have ICT based teaching facility. All departments, office, library, sports are connected through LAN with 20Mbps internet connection. There are well equipped and spacious laboratories for each department of science, Languages, Commerce and Management faculty. Laboratories have facility of browsing internet and printing is made available for students and staff. Total 16 LCD projectors for laboratories are available for ICT based practical sessions and teaching. Minor and Major equipments purchased are recorded in the stock register of each department. Purchase Committee recommends to CDC regarding to purchase various equipments need to fulfill physical and academic needs. Annual stock checking is carried by the Committee appointed by the Principal. The damaged equipments and other materials is write - off by taking the permission of the Management. We take

proper care to maintain the electrical facilities, fans, benches, classroom boards, dais, projectors provided in each class and lab. To ensure continuous electric supply for laboratories and research equipments college has installed 63KV Generator. To promote green energy practices, solar panels are installed in the College Campus and Girls Hostel building. Girls Hostel is equipped with Solar water Heater. Annual maintenance contracts are made to maintain cleanliness and safety of campus. There are 72501 Books and the 18 newspapers in the Central library of the College. To facilitate students for reading library supports departments to run their Departmental Libraries. A separate section is devoted to Mahatama Gandhi and Vinoba Bhave Literature as well as Women Studies. Library has subscribed membership of N list to access e-resources. Library provides reading room which have capacity of 125 seats. Reading room is open for students from 7:00am to 6:00pm. Outdoor and indoor game facilities are made available such as well equipped gymnasium and swimming pool. MoU has been signed with District Sport Office to utilize the sport complex. Efforts are taken to maintain the ground of college and all equipments. Dedicated Hardware Engineer is appointed for maintenance of computers and related equipments. College provides facilities like safe drinking water and clean washrooms. Fire extinguishers are installed in campus. There are 32 CCTV in the campus to continuous monitoring. To secure Girls Hostel, 14 CCTV cameras are installed. Safety measures are taken for the staff, students and the Infrastructure.
